This professional development program is offered to teachers to help them better understand the benefits of classroom blogs. The will get hands on experience creating a blog. Additionally, they will be able to customize their blog to what features will be best served in their classroom.

Teachers will find this to be an open discussion that will lay a basic foundation of knowledge and allow for exploration of ideas directed by our professional development leaders. Hopefully, teachers will maximize their time in this program and utilize it for the assistance of their classroom and school.

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Benefits of Classroom Blogging

Classrooms can benefit from blogs in numerous ways. For example, blogs allow for students to have a new form of communication that can help develop their reading, writing, and critical thinking skills.

Additionally, blogs allow for a

different method of demonstration of learning that offers more interactivity than the standard pen and pencil. Not to mention, students immediately will liven up as soon as they know technology and the internet is involved.

A major benefit of blogs is giving students a new perspective on the meaning of voice.

Overcoming Challenges

Lack of skill or knowledge of technology

We will introduce teachers to an easy set-up and application process.

Working with current curriculum requirements

We will guide teachers in discovering ways to use a blog alongside their general classroom work.

Allowing permission for students to use blog and privacy concerns

We will provide examples of guidelines and permission slips to be given to parents.

Needs Assessment

Districts, schools, and communities need better ways to utilize blogs as an effective instructional strategy and communication tool. As an instructional strategy blogs can capitalize on students' interest, buy-in, and strengths in many different areas of their academic instruction. As a communication tool blogs can reach out to different communities of people that are directly or indirectly related to the educational environment. Unfortunately, teachers and administrators do not take advantage of the effectiveness of blogs due to specific factors. Those factors include lack of technical skills, positive attitudes towards blogs, among other factors discovered in this needs assessment. Assuming that districts have technology available for teachers to implement blogs, the desired outcome is that teachers will feel comfortable to adapting their curriculum for use in a blog, as well as an environment to demonstrate student learning to a broader audience. Blogs should be viewed as a tool to better communicate and instruct students in an educational environment.

Interactive Educational Systems Design, Inc conducted a survey focusing on the use, attitudes, outcomes, concerns, and plans of U.S. school districts concerning Web 2.0 and collaborative technologies for the years 2009 and 2010, in *National Survey Report, Digital Districts: Web 2.0 and collaborative Technologies in U.S. School*, March 2011. The particular part of the survey that addresses this needs assessment was specifically about student-generated online content (e.g., class blogs, online postings of student works, wiki-type collaborative formats). The report surveyed 388 district technology directors.



In the sidebar the statistics clearly show a need for and interest in blogs in all levels of education. Finally, the study also surveyed participants about their concerns with student use of particular technologies. The survey also wanted to identify challenges for teachers to implement student-generated technology. The survey identified that 70% of respondents found that lack of teacher knowledge about how to use the technology effectively was the most challenging for this technology to be applied. Also, 36% of participants found that a teacher's perception of the technology's lack of instructional value or appropriateness is a challenge. The challenge of time required to use student-generated technology was found among 39% of the respondents. Finally, the survey discovered that 43% thought the most significant barrier to adopting student-generated online content was a "limited support system" (Interactive Educational Systems Design, Inc, 2011).

Teachers and administrators are constantly looking for both a valuable instructional strategy and a way to demonstrate to members of their educational community the learning capabilities of their students. Blogs give opportunity to fulfill that need because it helps students become more aware and involved in their learning, as well a place for demonstration of their learning to peers, administrators, parents, and even larger audiences. Mac Bride and Luehmann (2008) express that classroom blogs can provide opportunities for teachers to capitalize on

established interest in online communication and focus that interest towards their academic study. Students have the ability and *want* to communicate online. Teachers should utilize professional development centered on blogging as an opportunity to capitalize upon theirs students' *want* to participate in their classroom in a way that sparks their interest. Blogs combine a school's need to provide a way to

demonstrate students' learning and a valuable instructional strategy for a classroom.

The teachers and technology directors surveyed in Interactive Educational Systems Design, Inc review found useful information on the use, attitudes, concerns, and plans of student-generated online content (blogs). Participants showed that fewer teachers are using blogs as an effective tool in their classrooms compared to the previous year. This reduction shows that there is a need to find out why teachers do not feel comfortable using blogs in their classroom. This may somewhat reflect the mixed attitudes towards using blogs in the classroom. Findings were split almost down the middle of a positive reception of blogs compared to an ambivalent or mixed attitude towards blogs. This split shows that there is a need to create an awareness of how well blogs can be used in a classroom so that attitudes will change. In addition to addressing a person's attitude about blogs it is also important to be aware of their concerns. For

purposes of planning this professional development, it was interesting to find out that their main concern for teachers and technology directors was students' safety online. Furthermore, this survey showed that 63.4% of respondents are posting content online in their professional development communities and 48.6% use online communication and collaboration tools (blogs) as well. Obviously, teachers are willing to use blogs to demonstrate their own learning, but could use further direction in how to use blogs effectively in their classrooms for their students. For the fact that the survey identified that 70% of respondents found that lack of teacher knowledge about how to use the technology effectively was a challenge, proves that professional development on blogging is vital to assisting schools and their staff on how valuable blogging can be.

According to the survey conducted both students and teachers are familiar and connected personally to blogs, but a gap needs to be closed so that blogs can be used successfully by both students and teachers. In order to do so resources need to be available so that they can be used in an appropriate manner. The resources that are needed are access to the internet, and software that applies to blogging (i.e., Wordpress, Edublogs, etc.). There are many different software applications that are appropriate for basic application of blogs. Also, it would be helpful if teachers brought any curriculum that they would like to use when implementing blogs. Given these resources, participants in this professional development will find useful information that can better enhance the educational environment for both teachers and students.

Goals and Purpose

The short term goal for this professional development is to identify and understand what the benefits of blogging are and how you can best utilize those benefits in your own classroom setting. The long term goal for your professional development is to develop and maintain a blog that can be used to improve the communication between you and parents, you and fellow teachers, and you and your students.

Through this professional development you should be able to gain insight into what your strengths can be in creating a blog and how you can best serve the community of your own classroom. There will be many opportunities to discuss with your colleagues in order to formulate ideas and gain some perspective on what could and should be included in your own blog.

Ultimately, once you have completed this professional development you should feel confident enough to use your newly developed tools in order to create a blog that will help improve

Appendix A
